SENATE RESOLUTION 4

A RESOLUTION

ON THE DEATH OF THE HONORABLE LYNN LOCKHART.

On July 29, 1968, at the age of seventy-three years, the Honorable Lynn Lockhart passed away in the City of Phoenix, Arizona.

Mr. Lockhart was born in Dardanelle, Arkansas, and had been an Arizona resident since 1920. Until coming to Phoenix a few years ago, Mr. Lockhart had been a resident of Springerville, where he operated a cattle ranch near Nutrioso in Apache County.

During his many years in Arizona, Mr. Lockhart was active in many endeavors. At one time he was Vice President of the Lockhart Oil Company in Starr County, Texas. He was Chairman of the State Oil and Gas Conservation Commission until his resignation in 1967. He also served six years as Chairman of the Arizona Game and Fish Commission and was a member of the Arizona Industrial Commission. Mr. Lockhart was an active member of the El Zaribah Shrine Temple and the Elks Lodge, and a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.

The Honorable Lynn Lockhart served with distinction in the Twenty-second, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Legislatures in the Arizona Senate. He served on several Standing Committees, including Tourist and Industry Development, Suffrage and Elections, Livestock and Public Lands, all of which he was Chairman. Moreover, he was Vice Chairman during the period of 1955 to 1960, of the Fish and Game Committee. Other Standing Committees on which he served are as follows: Banking

and Insurance, Highways and Bridges, Livestock and Public Lands, Military and Veterans Affairs and Mines and Mining. Therefore

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona:

That the members of the Senate sincerely regret the passing of the Honorable Lynn Lockhart, and do, therefore, extend condolences to the surviving members of his family.

SENATE RESOLUTION 5

A RESOLUTION

ON THE DEATH OF GENERAL DWIGHT DAVID EISENHOWER.

People throughout the world mourn the death of General Dwight David Eisenhower, affectionately known as "Ike", the thirty-fourth President of the United States who passed away on March 28, 1969.

Dwight David Eisenhower was born in Denison, Texas on October 14, 1890. He graduated from High school in Abilene, Kansas in 1909. In 1911 the distinguished and honorable military career of Dwight David Eisenhower began when he entered the United States Military Academy. Graduating in 1915 he was commissioned as a second lieutenant. Dwight David Eisenhower advanced through the ranks to become Commanding General, European Theatre of Operation and Commander in Chief of Allied Forces in Africa in World War II. He directed the invasions of Sicily and Italy and led the D-Day invasion of Normandy. Later General Dwight David Eisenhower was appointed commander of the United States occupation forces in Europe. He then served as Chief of Staff, United States Army from 1945 until 1948.

In 1948 General Eisenhower retired from active duty in the Army and was appointed president of Columbia University. In late 1950 he was granted an indefinite leave of absence from Columbia to serve as commander of the forces of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in Europe. In 1952 he turned over command of the NATO forces in Europe and resigned from the
