HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 2010

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of the Honorable Lorna E. Lockwood.

The Honorable Lorna E. Lockwood, the first woman to serve as a state court chief justice in the United States, and a former member of the Arizona House of Representatives, passed away on September 23, 1977 in Phoenix, Arizona.

Justice Lockwood was born in Douglas, Arizona on March 24, 1903. Her father, the Honorable Alfred Collins Lockwood, served on the Arizona Supreme Court from 1925 through 1942. The younger Justice Lockwood aspired early in life to follow in her father's footsteps. She graduated from the University of Arizona in 1923, and from the University of Arizona's College of Law in 1925.

From 1939 to 1942, Justice Lockwood practiced law and served in the Arizona House of Representatives during its Fourteenth and Fifteenth Legislatures. In 1942, she became an assistant to Arizona's Congressional Representative, John R. Murdock, and in 1943 served on the wartime Office of Price Administration.

Following the War's conclusion, Justice Lockwood returned to Arizona and again entered the private practice of law. In 1947, she was elected to the Arizona House of Representatives to serve in the Eighteenth Legislature. During her legislative career, Justice Lockwood served with distinction on the Banking and Insurance, Child Welfare, Education, Public Health, Rules, Ways and Means, Constitutional Amendments and Referendum, and Highways and Bridges Committees, and also served as Chairman of the Judiciary Committee.

Justice Lockwood held the position of Assistant Attorney General in 1949 and 1950, and was a judge of the Superior Court in Maricopa County from 1951 to 1960. Her keen interest in the welfare of adolescents manifested itself during her three and a half years as a judge of the Juvenile Court. Justice Lockwood's illustrious career of public service was capped by her election to the Arizona Supreme Court, where she was acclaimed as one of Arizona's most able and distinguished jurists. In 1965, she became Chief Justice of that august tribunal, and as such became the first woman in United States history to serve as a chief justice. Her renown as a jurist of limitless enthusiasm and ability resulted in her being considered a candidate for the United States Supreme Court.

Justice Lockwood was tirelessly involved in many and varied civic, charitable and professional organizations and received numerous awards recognizing

her distinguished service. She will long be remembered by the people of the State of Arizona.

ORAL L. McDANIEL

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 2020

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of the Honorable Oral L. McDaniel.

The Honorable Oral L. McDaniel passed away at the age of seventy-four on May 7, 1977, in the City of Phoenix.

A native of Texas, Mr. McDaniel came to Arizona in 1916. For many years he engaged in farming and the cattle business. He was a past president of the Racing Commission of Arizona and a director of the Southern Arizona Bank.

Mr. McDaniel was first elected to the Arizona House of Representatives to serve in the Fourteenth Legislative Session beginning in 1938 and also served in the Fifteenth, Sixteenth and Seventeenth Legislatures as a member of the House of Representatives. Selected by his fellow legislators for a leadership role, Mr. McDaniel served as Speaker of the House during the Sixteenth Legislature. He was elected to the Senate in the Eighteenth Legislature.

During his tenure in the House of Representatives Mr. McDaniel served on the Agriculture and Irrigation, Livestock, Judiciary and Public Lands Committees, as Chairman of the Public Institutions and the Ways and Means Committees and as Vice-Chairman of the Rules Committee. As a member of the Senate in the Eighteenth Legislature he served on the Agriculture and Irrigation, Education, Highways and Bridges and the Planning and Development Committees and as Chairman of the Municipalities Committee. Therefore

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Arizona, the Senate concurring:

That the Legislature regrets the passing of the Honorable Oral L. McDaniel and extends its most sincere sympathies and condolences to his widow and his surviving relatives.
