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After serving in public office in Coconino County, Judge Clark moved to Prescott in 1902. Here, specializing in mining law he quickly developed a large law practice. Again, demonstrating his interest in public affairs and his willingness to serve, the people of Yavapai County elected him as their County Attorney. Later he served as the Prescott City Attorney.

Judge Clark and his son practiced together in Prescott until 1920 when they moved to Phoenix and Judge Clark continued his practice until his retirement in 1953. Therefore

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:

1. That the death of Hon. Ellias S. Clark marks the departure from this life of a significant person whose life was inextricably bound with the development and history of the Territory and subsequently the State of Arizona.

2. The condolences of the Legislature are extended to the surviving relatives of the Honorable Ellias S. Clark.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

A JOINT RESOLUTION

ON THE DEATH OF HON. FRANK T. POMEROY.

On the fourth day of November, 1954, death came to the Honorable Frank T. Pomeroy, a former member of the Arizona Legislature and a true pioneer of Arizona in every sense of the word. He passed away at his home in Mesa at the age of eighty-four years.

Mr. Pomeroy was the son of Francis Martin Pomeroy, who headed the band of eighty-three Mormons that left Paris, Idaho, on September 15, 1877, and arrived in Arizona in

October, 1877. The band decided to settle on the Mesa-land at a location that years later became the City of Mesa.

The boy of pioneer stock, who had arrived in Arizona in his seventh year, grew to manhood and became a leader and a bulwark of strength to his community and the Territory and State of Arizona.

Mr. Pomeroy was possessed of great ability, sound judgment and an abundance of energy. His life's work consisted largely of farming, business and the publication of a magazine.

He was a devout member and leader of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and at the time of his death had been for ten years patriarch of that church. He was a true friend of the Indian people and was beloved by them.

Mr. Pomeroy was called upon by his people to serve them as a member of the House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature, and as a member of the Senate of the Tenth, Eleventh and Thirteenth Legislatures. In those positions he rendered distinguished service. Therefore

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:

The Legislature has learned with deep regret of the passing of Honorable Frank T. Pomeroy, and desires to express the gratitude of the people of Arizona for the many years of devoted service rendered the state by Mr. Pomeroy. This body extends heartfelt condolences to the surviving members of his family.

Passed the House January 17, 1955 by the following vote:
80 Ayes, 0 Nays, 0 Not Voting.

Passed the Senate February 7, 1955 by the following vote:
28 Ayes, 0 Nays, 0 Not Voting.

Approved by the Governor—February 7, 1955.
