HOUSE RESOLUTION 12

A RESOLUTION

ON THE DEATH OF THE HONORABLE ROSALIO RONQUILLO.

The Honorable Rosalio Ronquillo passed away on November 21, 1963, in Tucson, Arizona, at the age of fifty-three years.

Rosalio Ronquillo was a native of Mexico and as a child he became a resident of Tucson, Arizona, where he obtained his elementary and high school education.

During his lifetime Mr. Ronquillo distinguished himself through his business, civic and political activities. After the death of the Honorable Paul J. Riley, in March, 1952, the Pima County Board of Supervisors appointed Rosalio Ronquillo to serve his unexpired term as a member of the Arizona House of Representatives. Later that year a Special Session of the Legislature was called and Mr. Ronquillo served during that Special Session. However, he did not become a candidate for the Legislature after his term expired.

Rosalio Ronquillo was active in many civic organizations. He served as President of the Junta Patriotica during World War II and was founder of the League of Allied Groups and Clubs of Arizona, Inc.; Club Anahuac, a businessmen's organization, and was the co-founder of the Better Government for Pima County organization. He was also a member of the Alianza Hispano-American Club Atina.

Mr. Ronquillo is remembered for a Christmas party which he held each year for Indian children from San Xavier Mission.

Therefore

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Arizona:

That the Members of the House of Representatives sincerely regret the passing of the Honorable Rosalio Ronquillo and do, therefore, extend condolences to the surviving members of his family.

A RESOLUTION

ON THE DEATH OF THE HONORABLE HARRY S. RUPPELIUS.

The Honorable Harry S. Ruppelius, a former member of the Arizona House of Representatives and distinguished Speaker of the House of Representatives during the Twenty-second Legislature, passed away on February 2, 1964, as the result of an unfortunate one-car accident near Florence Junction on U. S. Route 60-70.

The unfortunate and untimely death of Harry S. Ruppelius closed a career of success in his chosen profession of accountancy, service to his Country during time of war, service to his community, and an active interest in the political affairs of his State.

Harry S. Ruppelius was born in Mammoth, Arizona, on November 9, 1912. He attended Kenilworth Grammar School and graduated from Phoenix Union High School. He also attended the College at Tempe, now known as Arizona State University.

During World War II, the Honorable Harry S. Ruppelius served his Nation competently and well as a member of the Air Corps for a period of three years. After his discharge from the Air Corps and his return to private life, Harry S. Ruppelius continued his active interest in military affairs and became a distinguished member of the American Legion, Luke Greenway Post No. 1. He performed many functions for this American Legion Post and the membership recognized his active interest in their affairs. He served the membership as their auditor and in many other beneficial ways.

The Honorable Harry S. Ruppelius promoted the welfare of his chosen career, which was accountancy. He helped organize the Arizona Association of Accountants, Inc., and he was a member of the Arizona Estate Planning Council and the National Society of Public Accountants. He was always active on behalf of the accountancy profession, it being his desire to help lift this profession to the highest possible level.
