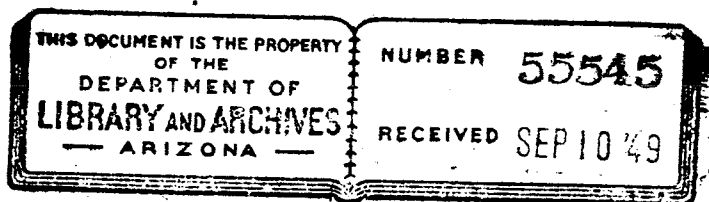

A RESOLUTION

On the death of Hon. Rachael E. Berry

Whereas, Rachael E. Berry passed away at her home in Phoenix, November 25, 1948, at the age of eighty-nine years.

Answering the call of President John Taylor for pioneers to aid in the colonization of Arizona, Mrs. Berry came to Arizona in 1882 and settled with her husband and two children in St. Johns, where she soon became active in church and social work, and served for many years as a trustee of the school at St. Johns.

In recognition of her qualities of leadership, Mrs. Berry was chosen in 1914 to represent the people of Apache county in the House of Representatives of the Second Legislature, the first woman to be so honored in Arizona. In that body she served with dignity and efficiency, occupying the post of chairman of the Committee on Good Roads, and serving as a member of the Committees on Education and Counties and County Affairs. Therefore

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of  
the State of Arizona:

1. The death of Hon. Rachael E. Berry, pioneer  
and stateswoman, is recorded with deep regret, and  
the sympathy of the members of this body is extended  
to her son, daughters, and other surviving relatives.
